### Different Text Types in a Newspaper - Malin Listén

The news feature is just what the name implies: a feature article that focuses on a topic in the news. News features are often published in the main news, or "A" section, or the local news, or "B" section, of a paper. These stories focus on hard-news topics but aren't deadline stories. They bring a softer writing style to hard news.

### Types of Feature Stories for Journalists

Standard non-fiction text features like captions, tables, sub-headings, and sidebars are great ways for students to clue in on the main idea of what they are about to read. If students have a prediction about the general topic in their reading, they will anticipate certain vocabulary and ideas, and their reading will be more accurate.
